Beginnings of Peace Movement

- ➤ Women's Peace Congress (1/10/1915): D.C.'s Willard Hotel, 3,000 attendees invited by Pacifists/Suffragists IWSA Pres. Carrie Chapman Catt and Jane Addams; created "Program for Constructive Peace" and formed Woman's Peace Party.
- The Hague Congress (4/1915): Peace Palace, 1,500 attendees (47 from the U.S.), Woman's Peace Party President Jane Addams presiding, passed 20 resolutions, including a proposal to carry Congress resolutions to WWI warring leaders to initiate and accept mediation. Women met with leaders during 35 visits, but no leader agreed to mediate an end to the war.

The Hague Congress Resolutions

- "We women at this International Congress:
- protest against the madness and horror of war
- Furge the governments of the world to put an end to this bloodshed and to begin peace negotiations
- Furge the governments of all nations to refer future disputes to arbitration and conciliation."

Advocates of Peace and Women's Rights

Jane Addams, 1860 - 1935

- Founded Hull House, 1889
- Authored articles, speeches, and 4 books: *Newer Ideals of Peace*, 1907
- ➤ Pres., Nat'l Conf. of Charities and Corrections, 1909 1915
- Pres., Woman's Peace Party
- ➤ Child/Women labor rights, laws
- >ACLU, NAACP, NAWSA
- ► Pres., WILPF, 1919 1929
- Nobel Peace Prize, 1931
- Supported League of Nations

Carrie Chapman Catt, 1859 - 1947

- Sup. of Schools, Mason City, at age 24
- ▶ Pres., NAWSA, 1900 1904/1915 -1920:
- "Winning Plan," 19th Amend.
- ► Pres., Int'l Woman Suffrage Alliance, 1904 – 1923; nine years worldwide
- League of Women Voters, 1920
- Founder, Committee on the Cause and Cure of War, 1925 -1932
- Authored articles, speeches, books: Why Wars Must Cease, 1935
- Supported League of Nations, United Nations

• Media Workshop, June 1st

In the lead-up to the official press release of our Statement, we will be holding a media workshop webinar focusing on writing impactful Letters to the Editor. The result will be a tidal wave of voices calling media attention to the unacceptable threat of nuclear weapons and to the Ban Treaty as a powerful tool to address it. The timing of this workshop is designed to maximize the impact of the release of the Statement on June 7th. We plan to release the Statement and the list of its signers on June 7. We urge all signers to contribute Letters to the Editor, and/or otherwise engage, alert, and leverage the media (popular, social, internal!) to promote the Statement and build out the discourse around the Ban Treaty. We also invite groups to plan a public event, such as a reading of the Statement at a local nuclear site, legislative office, or otherwise relevant location, on June 7th. This will serve as a building block for broader attention, both in the media and in the general public, to the TPNW.
